

CIBC Multi-Asset Absolute Return Strategy - Series A

This document contains key information you should know about Series A units of CIBC Multi-Asset Absolute Return Strategy. You can find more details in the fund's simplified prospectus. Before you invest in any fund, consider how the fund would work with your other investments and your tolerance for risk.

This mutual fund is an alternative mutual fund. It has the ability to invest in asset classes and use investment strategies that are not permitted for conventional mutual funds. The specific strategies that differentiate this fund from conventional mutual funds include the: increased use of derivatives for hedging and non-hedging purposes; increased ability to sell securities short; ability to borrow cash to use for investment purposes; and increased ability to invest in physical commodities. While these specific strategies will be used in accordance with the fund's investment objectives and strategies, during certain market conditions they may accelerate the pace at which your investment decreases in value.

What does the fund invest in?

The fund seeks to achieve a positive absolute return that exceeds the return of the Government of Canada 91-day treasury bills over a rolling three-year period, regardless of prevailing economic conditions, by actively managing a diversified portfolio with direct and indirect exposure primarily to equity securities, fixed income securities, commodities, currencies, derivatives and other financial instruments to access alternative investment strategies. The fund may invest in Canadian, U.S. and other foreign securities, including securities of issuers in emerging market countries and securities denominated in a currency other than the Canadian dollar.

The fund may create leverage through the use of derivatives, short sales, and/or borrowing. The fund's aggregate exposure, calculated as the sum of the following, must not exceed 300% of its net asset value: (i) the aggregate market value of securities sold short; (ii) the aggregate value of indebtedness under any borrowing arrangements for investment purposes; and (iii) the aggregate notional value of the fund's specified derivatives positions excluding the notional value of any specified derivatives used for hedging purposes.

How risky is it?

The value of the fund can go down as well as up. You could lose money.

One way to gauge risk is to look at how much a fund's returns change over time. This is called "volatility".

In general, funds with higher volatility will have returns that change more over time. They typically have a greater chance of losing money and may have a greater chance of higher returns. Funds with lower volatility tend to have returns that change less over time. They typically have lower returns and may have a lower chance of losing money.

Risk rating

CIBC Asset Management has rated the volatility of this fund as **Low to Medium**.

This rating is based on how much the fund's returns have changed from year to year. It does not tell you how volatile the fund will be in the future. The rating can change over time. A fund with a low risk rating can still lose money.

Like most mutual funds, this fund does not have any guarantees. You may not get back the amount of money you invest.

How has the fund performed?

This section tells you how Series A units of the fund have performed over the past year. Returns are after expenses have been deducted. These expenses reduce the fund's returns.

YEAR-BY-YEAR RETURNS

This chart shows how Series A units of the fund performed in the past calendar year. The range of returns and change from year to year can help you assess how risky the fund has been in the past. It does not tell you how the fund will perform in the future.



BEST AND WORST 3-MONTH RETURNS

This table shows the best and worst returns for Series A units of the fund in a 3-month period over the past calendar year. The best and worst 3-month returns could be higher or lower in the future. Consider how much of a loss you could afford to take in a short period of time.

AVERAGE RETURN

The annual compounded return of Series A units of the fund since October 22, 2018 was 4.7%. If you had invested \$1,000 in the fund on October 22, 2018, your investment would be worth \$1,072 as at April 30, 2020.

Who is this fund for?

Investors who:

- seek exposure to a diversified portfolio of alternative investment strategies; and
- are investing for the medium to long term.

A word about tax

In general, you will have to pay income tax on any money you make on a fund. How much you pay depends on the tax laws where you live and whether or not you hold the fund in a registered plan such as a Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP) or a Tax-Free Savings Account (TFSA).

Keep in mind that if you hold your fund in a non-registered plan, fund distributions are included in your taxable income, whether you receive them in cash or have them reinvested.

How much does it cost?

The following tables show the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own, and sell Series A units of the fund. The fees and expenses - including any commissions - can vary among series of a fund and among funds. Higher commissions can influence representatives to recommend one investment over another. Ask about other funds and investments that may be suitable for you at a lower cost.

1. SALES CHARGES

There is an initial sales charge when you buy units of the fund.

2. FUND EXPENSES

You don't pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the fund's returns.

As at February 29, 2020, the expenses for Series A units of the fund were 2.87% of its value. This equals \$28.70 for every \$1,000 invested.

More about the trailing commission

The trailing commission is an ongoing commission. It is paid for as long as you own the fund. It is for the services and advice that your representative and their firm provide to you.

CIBC Asset Management Inc. pays the trailing commission to your representative's firm. It is paid from the fund's management fee and is based on the value of your investment.

For Series A units, a trailing commission of 0% to 1.00% of the value of your investment each year (\$0.00 to \$10.00 each year on every \$1,000 invested) is paid from the management fee.

3. OTHER FEES

You may have to pay other fees when you buy, hold, sell, switch, or convert units of the fund.

Fee	What you pay
Short-term trading fee	Up to 2% of the value of units you sell or switch within 30 days of buying them. This fee goes to the fund.
Switch fee	If you sell units of the fund to buy units of another fund managed by us or our affiliates, you may pay a switch fee of up to 2% of the value of units you switch. This fee goes to your representative's firm.
Conversion fee	If you convert units of the fund to another series of units of the same fund, you may pay a conversion fee of up to 2% of the value of units you convert. This fee goes to your representative's firm.

What if I change my mind?

Under securities law in some provinces and territories, you have the right to:

- withdraw from an agreement to buy mutual funds within two business days after you receive a simplified prospectus or Fund Facts document, or
- cancel your purchase within 48 hours after you receive confirmation of the purchase.

In some provinces and territories, you also have the right to cancel a purchase, or in some jurisdictions, claim damages, if the simplified prospectus, annual information form, Fund Facts document, or financial statements contain a misrepresentation. You must act within the time limit set by the securities law in your province or territory.
